

Tohono O'odham (Uto-Aztecan; Arizona)

Tohono O'odham (also known as Papago) has dental stops [t̪] and [d̪] as well as alveopalatal affricates [t̪ʃ] and [d̪ʒ]. Their distribution is illustrated below.

- The five vowel phonemes of the language are all represented in this data set.
- [ɨ] is a high central unrounded vowel.
- Not all of the [t̪ d̪ t̪ʃ d̪ʒ] examples in this data set are word-initial.
