Tohono O'odham (Uto-Aztecan; Arizona)

Tohono O'odham (also known as Papago) has dental stops [t] and [d] as well as alveopalatal affricates [t] and [d]. Their distribution is illustrated below.

- The five vowel phonemes of the language are all represented in this data set.
- [i] is a high central unrounded vowel.
- Not all of the $[t \ d \ t] \ ds$ examples in this data set are word-initial.
