Prescriptivist discussion of Latin spelling

Data and description excerpted from Campbell (2004)

The *Appendix Probi* ('Appendix of Probus') was compiled in the 3rd–4th century ce. It lists 227 Latin words. These examples are of the form *X non Y*, that is, 'X not Y,' where the scribe considers the 'X' form 'correct' and the 'Y' form 'incorrect'.

For this exercise, assume that the forms on the left of *non* represent conservative and thus older pronunciations and that the forms on the right of *non* correspond to later pronunciations which result from changes in the language.
