3. Social attitudes and language varieties

- "Objective: Explain how the three research studies reviewed in Ch 2 relate to each other and to the Oakland "Ebonics" controversy. Specifically, the details of the third research study. We've discussed the Cypriot dialect study a lot and the Swedish study to some extent, but not as much about the last study."

- "Analyzing and understanding statistics in the linguistic world."
